


ANNUAL REPORT FOR 2019


CLIENT CHARACTERISTICS

- 100% lived well below the poverty line
- 98% had a mental health diagnosis
- 89% struggled with addiction
- 94% had a background of domestic violence
- 57% had not completed high school
- 39% experienced disruption in childhood (foster care, runaways)
- 34% had at least one felony conviction

In all, 42% were African American, 58% were Caucasian, and 6% of those also identify as Hispanic.

- The average age of the mothers is 31.
- The average age of the children is 5.4.





IN 2019 SHEFFIELD PLACE FACED MORE DEMAND THAN EVER

In 2019, Sheffield Place continued its strategic imperative to serve more families with more services in four programs:

- 1. Residential housing at the facility
- 2. Residential clinical services
- 3. Aftercare (ongoing case management and supportive services for families that have transitioned from the facility to permanent housing in the community)
- 4. Permanent supportive housing—Sheffield Place owns 10 units of housing towards goal of 15 units over the next few years

In 2019, Sheffield Place served a total of 123 families (307 individuals) more than six fold increase from the 20 families served in 2010.

PERMANENT HOUSING

Sheffield Place completed renovations on one house and owned 10 houses at year's end with 90% occupancy. Multiple barriers to success make the path from homelessness to self-sufficiency extremely difficult, but achievable.

OUTCOMES					
Residential Housing Services	66% exited to permanent housing; 74% for mothers who stayed more than 30 days.	The average length of stay 2.7 months for all families; 3.4 months for families that stayed longer than 30 days.	Of all mothers, 1% were employed at intake and 35% secured employment during their stay. Of the mothers who stayed longer than 30 days, 8% were employed at intake and 38% were employed at discharge.

JILL'S STORY



As much as she resisted the structure of Sheffield Place at first, she now likes it. Jill is twenty years old with a six month old baby, Alexa. Jill has succeeded in entering recovery from meth addiction. She found a job, secured daycare, navigated the bus system, and engaged with the program.



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RAMONA'S STORY

Ramona and her daughter, Ailey, age three years, arrived at Sheffield Place three months ago.
Ramona started smoking meth with her mother at age nine. She's now twenty-two. Her mother and father have both done time in prison on drug

charges.

Ramona came to Sheffield Place with an active addiction. She began treatment when she arrived. She was severely underweight and in a constant state of agitation. Ailey had yet to begin to talk and cried often.



One day, Ramona mistakenly thought that her child would be taken from her by the Children's Division. Drawing on her trauma and the fight or flight response, she was prepared to leave Sheffield Place and runaway with her child to avoid authorities. Her case manager was able to address the situation and convince Ramona to remain at Sheffield Place.

Today, Ramona has six months of sobriety – her first time being clean from meth in more than half of her life. She has a job and rents a house that Sheffield Place owns. Ailey is talking and is a happy child.

"Thanks to Sheffield Place, my daughter and I now have a future that I never thought was possible," Ramona says.

SHEFFIELD PLACE VOLUNTEERS IN 2019

525 volunteers provided 5193 hours of service or the equivalent of almost 2.5 FTE. The value of volunteer time is \$124,424 using Independent Sector's valuation of volunteer time in Missouri (\$23.96 per hour).



SHEFFIELD PLACE LAUNCHED 'A PLACE TO GROW' CAMPAIGN TO EXPAND CAPACITY

To meet a larger portion of the rapidly growing need for services, the agency launched a capital campaign to purchase and renovate an existing building into seven apartment units, purchase and renovate four houses in the neighborhood, modernize the kitchens, baths, and lighting at the main facility, upgrade IT infrastructure, and provide for programming, among other goals.
