

SHEFFIELD PLACE SERVES MORE FAMILIES IN 2022

Sheffield Place served more families in 2022 than in any previous year - 143 families – an increase of more than 700% from the 20 families served in 2010.

The growth has been dramatic and a strategic response to the overwhelming crisis of mother-led family homelessness in the community. Each year, the agency receives nearly 900 phone calls from families in search of services. That number has also grown from the 505 families that called in 2012.

Yet, the growth also extends to the increased number, intensity, and effectiveness of services over that time. The agency provides case management, therapy, addiction recovery, and 23 hours of groups each week. Group topics include positive parenting and healthy relationships, recovery, 12-Step, personal finance, job search/retention, and healthy lifestyles.

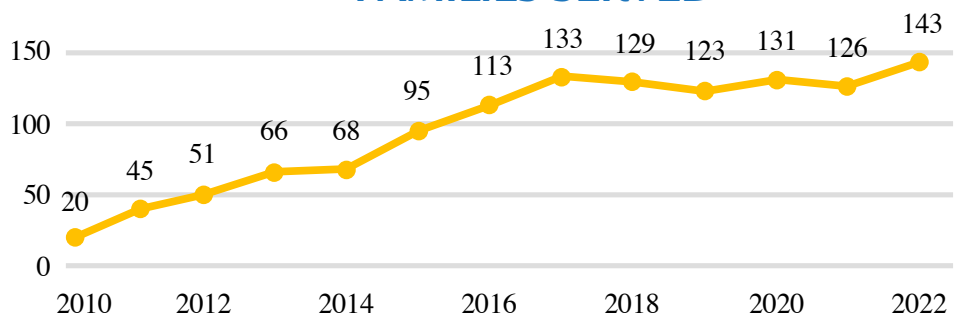
2022 Highlight - Renovation of the facility's first floor.



- The group room was expanded by one-third to accommodate the growing number of clients in group.
- A case management office was constructed by using a portion of the previous lobby space.
- The first floor kitchen was also remodeled to better accommodate volunteer groups that bring dinner on Sunday evenings and other celebrations.

SNAPSHOT OF FAMILIES IN 2022

Sheffield Place serves families with multiple barriers to self-sufficiency.

- **100%** of families were below poverty
- **100%** had a mental health diagnosis
- **97%** had substance abuse
- **84%** experienced domestic abuse
- **70%** had legal issues
- **60%** had Children's Division involvement
- **40%** had less than a HS/GED education
- **30%** had at least one felony
- **24%** had a background in foster care

OUTCOMES 2022

Residential Housing Services	58% exited to permanent housing; 76% for mothers who stayed more than 30 days.	58% of families stayed 30 days or longer.	Of all mothers, 23% improved income. Of the mothers who stayed longer than 30 days, 43% improved income.
Residential Clinical Services - Children	36% of children (6-18 years) increased or maintained functional mental health.	50% of mothers entered the program while their children were in state custody; half of these families were reunited.	65% of mothers improved parenting.
Residential Clinical Services - Adults	56% of all mothers improved or maintained functional mental health; 70% of those who stayed 30 days or longer improved or maintained functional mental health.	47% of all mothers were clean and sober at discharge; 87% of mothers who stayed 30 days or more were clean and sober at discharge.	83% of all mothers improved their score on the Protective Factors Survey (assesses multiple protective factors to prevent child abuse and neglect) 15% had no change and 2% decreased their score.
Aftercare Services	94% of families maintained permanent housing.	81% of mothers remained abstinent from alcohol and other drugs.	90% of families increased or maintained income.
Permanent Housing	100% of families maintained permanent housing.	100% of mothers maintained sobriety.	100% of families increased or maintained income.

A Client Story - Chrissy & Her Family

Sheffield Place empowers families like Chrissy's to make the difficult journey from homelessness to self-sufficiency. She shared her story: "If there is one word to describe my childhood, I'd say survivor. We never really had a family home. My mom would wake us up suddenly in the night and pack the car up and move us to different states. My mom was a crack addict and my father was never around. I was put in foster care at 13 years old, then again when I was 17, when I ran away to the streets. That was when I began smoking and drinking."

"It was when I had my first son that I woke up. I still struggled for stability. I only knew what I saw growing up. I continued drinking to ease my hidden pain. My son was put in foster care when he was 4. I found Sheffield Place online. I was so thankful to have my son, now 8, back. It's the best decision I've ever made for my little family. I'm so excited for my future."



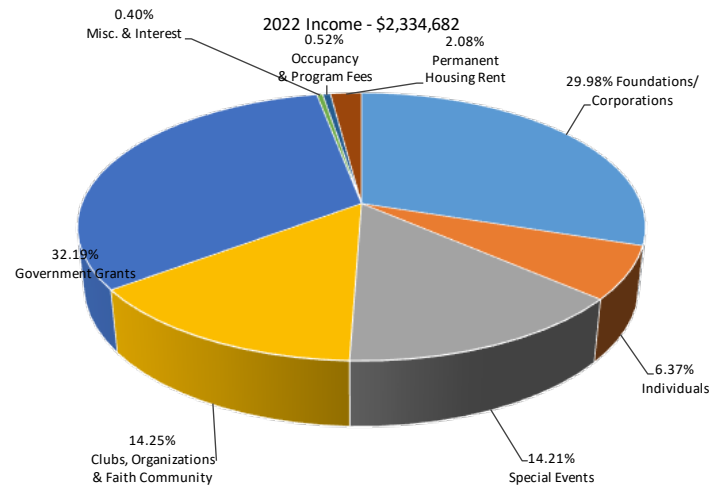
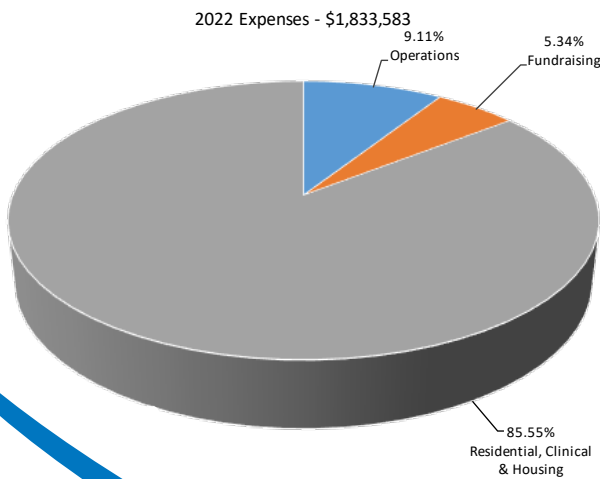
Sheffield Place Volunteers
